Acronet:

Combination of Acrostic and Nonet

Invented by Patricia A. Farnsworth-Simpson in 2008.

1. 18 lines. Two nine-line stanzas.
2. Syllable Count: 9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 1-2-3-4-5-6-7-8-9
3. Rhymed or unrhymed at poet's discretion.
4. An acrostic. The first letter of each line when read vertically spells out a phrase. In this example: No Easter Bunny Comes.
